MEET RESEARCH AUDIOLOGIST Chhayakant Patro, Ph.D.



“While in high school, I was fascinated by the profession of Audiology. I completed my Bachelor’s degree in speech and hearing, followed by a Master’s degree in Audiology in India. After completing my Master’s, I worked as a clinical audiologist in India for four years. In 2012, I moved to the United States to pursue a Ph.D. in 2012 and graduated in August 2016 with a degree in Audiology from the University of Memphis.

My education and clinical practice helped me to appreciate my interests, focus on specific areas of study to gain a better understanding of the field of Audiology.

I am particularly interested in the studying different auditory and cognitive factors that contribute to the benefits of hearing devices including hearing aids and cochlear implants. My long-term research goal is to capture and understand the fundamental causes of “individual variability” which is common in cochlear implant or hearing aid users. In addition, I am interested in developing different assessment tools and novel interventions to maximize speech understanding in adverse listening conditions.

I am excited to join Heuser Hearing Institute as a research audiologist to work on a research project that evaluates novel hearing aid processing schemes for hearing-impaired listeners. My studies come about through a collaborative project between Dr. Pavel Zahorik, Heuser Hearing Institute’s endowed research professor, and Dr. Olaf Streylick, processing researcher at Sonova. We will be recruiting subjects for the research project in early 2017. I can’t wait to see what the research project discovers. “

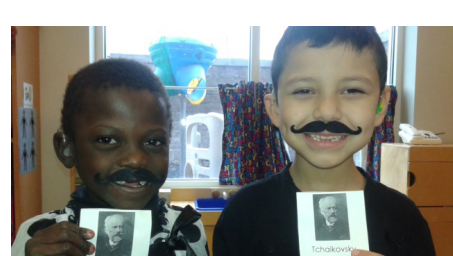
Santa visited us at HHLA!
