


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Research Update



Congratulations to Sabrina D'Souza, a graduate student at the University of Louisville's Speech-Language pathology program, for earning 1st place for her poster titled "Infant Directed Speech in Latin American Mothers" at the 2018 Kentucky Speech-Language-Hearing Association Convention in Lexington. The study, completed under the supervision of Dr. Kondaurava, a researcher at Heuser Hearing Institute and an assistant professor at the UofL, examined acoustic characteristics of mothers' speech to their young children in English, Spanish, and English as a Second Language. The Link Between Gender & Hearing Loss

Chances are, you probably equate hearing loss with factors such as advanced age and exposure to loud noise. It might surprise you to learn there is a correlation between gender and hearing loss, as well. Overall, men are almost twice as likely to develop hearing loss as women.

The link between gender and hearing loss has a bit to do with aging. Because women tend to outlive men, they are more likely to end up living alone; this often results in a lack of financial security and may lead to depression, as well as certain physical conditions such as osteoporosis and thyroid disease. Men, on the other hand, have a greater risk of developing hearing loss in large part due to their participation in activities and occupations that expose them to dangerously high decibel levels. In societies where hazardous noise exposure is not a factor, men and women lose their hearing at about the same rate—evidence of this link. Consumption of analgesics may also be a contributing factor. Men are more likely to take aspirin on a daily basis due to concerns over their cardiovascular health.

Sociological factors aside, biology may also play a role. Across the board, women have better high-frequency hearing than men, especially above 2000 Hz. Paradoxically, this advantage decreases with age; by the time they turn 60, women are losing their low-frequency hearing at a faster rate than men—a phenomenon known as "gender reversal." Some theorize this is due to changes in ovarian steroid hormone production, which appears to boost hearing sensitivity in women prior to menopause. Because of this reversal, gender differences in hearing loss become much less pronounced in older individuals.

Interestingly, tinnitus—commonly referred to as a "ringing in the ears" and often a side effect of hearing loss—affects greater numbers of women than men. Women report more annoyance and stress due to the debilitating effects of tinnitus and are more likely to suffer from mental anguish and lack of sleep despite the fact that their tinnitus is generally not as loud as that experienced by men. This suggests that women are less effective at coping with tinnitus. Leading researchers to recommend exercise and relaxation techniques to help women manage their symptoms. Group therapy may prove especially helpful.
